Mill Pond Apartments Receive Hailstorm Repairs

The 25th of May marked the one-year anniversary of the notorious hailstorm that left many homes in the Dayton-area in need of repair.

The Mill Pond Apartment Community in Bellbrook, Ohio (owned by Gold Key Properties), was no exception to the rule and received extensive hail damage to each of its 39 buildings. Windows, siding, roofing, gutters and condensing units would all need to be replaced while residents remained in the nearly fully occupied complex.

Greater Dayton Construction Group's Emergency Response Team was on-site the day after the storm to board up broken windows and clean up shattered glass. Once windows were repaired by the facility, GDCG began the remaining reconstruction efforts.

Repairs to the roofs of the units included the removal of 600,000 sqft of existing shingles (upon inspection, there were 2 layers of shingles on the roofs). New CertainTeed 3-tab shingles in "Weathered Wood" would replace the old shingles.

The original "Double-4" siding was removed and sent off for recycling (recycling of the existing siding was done through Fryman's Recycling) and was replaced with "Double-5" Dutchlap siding. Siding colors were selected based upon the previous color palette (exception: units with the original "Baby-Blue" siding – shown below – were replaced with a more modern "Clay"color).

The project came to substantial completion on February 28th once all gutters and HVAC units were replaced, and finishing touches to the additional damaged trim will be completed later this month.

OSHA Creates Campaign To Prevent Heat Illness for Outdoor Workers

With Summer heat right around the corner, the Occupational Safety and Health Association (OSHA) has started a campaign to inform outdoor workers of precautions to take to avoid suffering from heat illness such as, a heatstroke, heat exhaustion or water toxication.

Who is affected? Workers exposed to hot and humid conditions are at risk of heat illness, especially those doing heavy work tasks or using bulky protective clothing and equipment. Some workers might be at greater risk than others if they have not built up a tolerance to hot conditions.

What is heat illness? The body normally cools itself by sweating. During hot weather, especially with high humidity, sweating isn't enough. Body temperature can rise to dangerous levels if precautions are not taken. Heat illnesses range from heat rash and heat cramps to heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Heat stroke can result in death and requires immediate medical attention.

How can heat illness be prevented? Remember three simple words: water, rest, shade. Drinking water often, taking breaks, and limiting time in the heat can help prevent heat illness. Employers should include these prevention steps in worksite training and plans. Gradually build up to heavy work in hot conditions.

This helps you build tolerance to the heat – or become acclimated. Employers should take steps that help workers become acclimated, especially workers who are new to working outdoors in the heat or have been away from work for a week or more. Gradually increase workloads and allow more frequent breaks during the first week of work. Also, it's important to know and look out for the symptoms of heat illness in yourself and others during hot weather. Plan for an emergency and know what to do — acting quickly can save lives!

GDCG Earns Another Perfect Score on Contractor Connection Report

In May of 2011, GDCG was designated one of the country's top performers in the insurance restoration industry by Contractor Connection.

In December, GDCG again earned a 5 out of 5 on the Performance Objective Monitoring System (POMS) and has done so again for the month of April.

The POMS score is determined by time in process and quality assurance. POMS scores are given each month and then averaged up at the end of each year.

For 2010, GDCG had an average POMS score of 4.46 and in 2011 had a POMS score of 3.72. Contractor Connection has sited overall POMS scores being lower than usual during this span due in part to the extreme weather and high assessment volume.

OSHA Raises Awareness for Falls

OSHA has partnered with the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health and National Occupational Research Agenda (NORA) to raise awareness among workers and employers about common fall hazards in construction, and how falls from ladders, scaffolds and roofs can be prevented and lives can be saved. Here's how:

PLAN ahead to get the job done safely

When working from heights, such as ladders, scaffolds, and roofs, employers must plan projects to ensure that the job is done safely. Begin by deciding how the job will be done, what tasks will be involved, and what safety equipment may be needed. When estimating the cost of a job, employers should include safety equipment, and plan to have all the necessary equipment and tools available at the construction site.

PROVIDE the right equipment

Workers who are six feet or more above lower levels are at risk for serious injury or death if they should fall. To protect these workers, employers must provide fall protection and the right equipment for the job, including the right kinds of ladders, scaffolds, and safety gear.

TRAIN everyone to use the equipment safely

Falls can be prevented when workers understand proper set-up and safe use of equipment, so they need training on the specific equipment they will use to complete the job. Employers must train workers in hazard recognition and in the care and safe use ladders, scaffolds, fall protection systems, and other equipment they'll be using on the job.
